"FROM SCRIBBLES TO ESSAYS: THE JOURNEY OF WRITING MASTERY FROM PREK TO GRADE 12"

The development of writing skills from PreK to Grade 12 is a gradual process that builds upon foundational techniques and progresses toward advanced composition. In PreK and early elementary grades, students begin with fine motor skills, learning to hold pencils and form letters. Emphasis is placed on phonemic awareness and the basics of spelling and sentence structure. By Grade 1, students are introduced to narrative writing, often starting with simple sentences and gradually moving to short paragraphs.

As students progress to the upper elementary grades (Grades 3-5), they develop more complex sentence structures and are introduced to different types of writing, such as descriptive, expository, and persuasive writing. They learn to organize their thoughts using graphic organizers and begin to understand the importance of coherence and flow. In middle school (Grades 6-8), students refine their writing techniques, focusing on thesis development, supporting arguments with evidence, and writing in different genres. They are taught to revise and edit their work critically.

By high school (Grades 9 -12), students engage in more sophisticated writing tasks, such as analytical essays, research papers, and creative writing. They learn to cite sources properly, craft wellsupported arguments, and develop a personal writing style, preparing them for college-level writing and beyond. At CBS, the journey from basic scribbles to polished essays reflects the structured growth of writing skills. Each stage builds upon the last, equipping students with the tools needed for clear, effective communication, ultimately preparing them for the demands of college, careers, and lifelong expression.

Sir Isaac Newton




